

COVER ART

As you drive along Hastings Street through Vancouver's downtown eastside you'll pass Ray-Cam Community Centre and see the mural from which the images in this Annual Report were taken.

Ray-Cam is an integral part of city life. The programs it offers have become exciting and important elements in the way neighbourhood youth learn about themselves and the realities of the world around them. Critical to the success of these programs and a hallmark of Ray-Cam's approach, is the active involvement of the young people, parents and community leaders in the design and administration of the Center's programs. Their work is something that Vancouver Foundation is proud to have been a part of.

On Ray-Cam's gym wall is a striking and colorful mural which was commissioned to coincide with and give a visual focus to the 1991 Census. It reflects a cross-section of the people who make up the vibrant, multicultural downtown eastside community and was designed to be readily understood and inclusive.

Richard Tetrault, a long time resident of Vancouver's East-end, designed the mural which, like so much of his other work, explores the human figure and the urban environment. He has had exhibitions around the world and has worked with children in the Greater Vancouver area in the design and painting of murals in their schools. Tetrault had the assistance of two other artists in the painting of the mural; Thomas Anfield who has done numerous murals and street paintings and Haruko Okano who draws upon her ancestry for her work in a variety of media.

To Ray-Cam and the artists, Vancouver Foundation extends its sincere thanks for the use of the mural's images which so vividly reflect the society we serve.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

It has been both a pleasure and a great honour to serve as Chairman of Vancouver Foundation for the past eight years. As of April 1995, I have retired and turned the office over to my very capable successor, Mr. Bruce Buchanan, who was Vice Chairman in 1994.

My involvement with Vancouver Foundation began in 1987 when I was elected Chairman to succeed Mr. Peter Kaye, who had wisely guided the Foundation following the death of Mr. W.J. VanDusen. Sadly, Peter Kaye died shortly after I took over so I was never able to draw upon his experience and wisdom.

Looking back, it has been a wonderful and exciting time. At the end of 1986, Vancouver Foundation's total capital was \$176 million; today that amount has more than doubled to \$400 million. In 1987, the total distributed income was \$13.5 million; in 1994, \$24 million was distributed to charitable organizations throughout British Columbia. During that time, the number of public and private funds and foundations in the Foundation's custodianship rose from 536 to 560.

While it is impossible to list all of the events that played a part in assuring the continued vitality of Vancouver Foundation, certain of these stand out in my mind as pivotal.

By far the most significant was the appointment of Richard Mulcaster as President and CEO in 1990. Richard brought both the wisdom of experience and a special perception of Vancouver Foundation's role in the province. Under his guidance, the Foundation has been able to attain its present size without increasing its staff, enabling administration costs to be kept within strict control.

A notable development not long after I became Chairman was the establishment of the Rick Hansen Man in Motion Legacy Fund. At \$20 million, this endowment represented a major increase in our capital.

More recently, Vancouver Foundation's relationship with the United Way of the Lower Mainland – always important – was strengthened and clarified, culminating with a legislative change in the Vancouver Foundation Act that permitted the establishment of the United Way of the Lower Mainland Endowment Fund within the Foundation.

The crucial role of our Advisory Committees was also strengthened. These knowledgeable volunteers who serve as advisors in their field of expertise were drawn closer to the Foundation through strategic planning sessions that helped identify emerging areas of need to which our granting programs could respond.

Another important event, in 1993, was the appointment of external money managers to manage our investment portfolio, which had grown to a size that required full time professional management. Due to market conditions, investment performance in 1994 was not as strong as in past but we anticipate higher returns in the future.

And lastly, in 1994, was the transfer of the assets of the W.J. VanDusen Foundation to Vancouver Foundation, which has acted as its agent for many years, assuring these assets will continue to benefit British Columbians in perpetuity.

I cannot close this report without expressing my gratitude to the members of the Board who have served with me over the past eight years, each of whom I can honestly say has made an immense contribution. Two of these distinguished members, Mr. Chris Hinkson, Q.C. and Mr. Stanley Kwok, also retired in April.

On behalf of the Board, I acknowledge and applaud the exceptional work of the Advisory Committee members who completed their term in 1994: Arts & Culture – Mr. Willard Holmes, Mr. Abraham Rogatnick, Mr. Hugh Davidson, Mr. David YH. Lui, Mr. Rodney Ward; Education – Dr. Elmer Froese, Mr. Alan C. Brown; Youth – Mr. Mark Griffith, Mr. Anton Kolstee; Environment – Mr. John Broadhead, Ms. Claire Dansereau; Child & Family – Mr. Peter Ashmore. In their places, I am pleased to welcome a number of new Advisory Committee members: Arts & Culture – Ms. Coleen Nemtin, Ms. Chick Rice, Mr. Phil Bernard, Mr. Chris Wootten; Health & Welfare – Ms. Shamin Lalani; Youth – Ms. Su-Anne Yeo, Mr. Dal Hothi; Child & Family – Ms. Sheila Davidson; Education – Mr. David Vogt.

And to the Foundation's dedicated staff, thank you for the unfailing support you have given me these past eight years. While my role with Vancouver Foundation is ending, I truly believe this is only the beginning. There are great things to come, and each of you will continue to be essential to the Foundation's success.



Looking ahead, I believe that the challenges Vancouver Foundation faces are the same challenges faced by society as a whole. Government cutbacks in funding of social services will continue to shift the onus for vital community services to agencies and volunteers in the non-profit sector. In turn, at Vancouver Foundation we will continue to experience increased demand on our resources.

As a permanent endowment to the people of British Columbia – a perpetual capital fund from which only the income is distributed – the Foundation is uniquely equipped to address that demand.

It has been said that giving money away is easy; the difficulty is in giving it away well. Because of our structure, Vancouver Foundation is able to accomplish just that: to support a wide range of charitable activities across B.C. in a manner that serves and preserves the philanthropic objectives of our generous donors while at the same time meeting the changing requirements of our society.

Vancouver Foundation has been built upon the cornerstones of good judgement, sound stewardship and sensitivity to B.C.'s unique social needs. In order for the Foundation to continue to keep pace with the rapid growth of the province, our future must be fuelled by an increase in discretionary funds – funds that can be channeled to the areas of greatest need.

In this way, the Foundation will best be able to take advantage of its unique structure and assure its donors that their gift will be put to good work, according to their wishes, in perpetuity.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Having been given a new and vastly expanded role by government in the provision of services through community-based organizations, the non-profit sector has emerged as the heart and soul of contemporary Canadian society. Whether through support of a transition house for a battered mother and her child, funding of AIDS research or development of cultural diversity initiatives, the sector is irrevocably linked – as never before – with the quality of life in British Columbia.

Yet, while our governments are pulling back and expecting the non-profit sector to do more, instead of giving the sector advantages that will enable it to respond to current social needs, the government is at the same time making the challenge more difficult.

Just as the corporate sector is regulated by the laws of supply and demand, the non-profit sector operates within a delicate balance of investment in resources and demand for services. Unfortunately the senior levels of government have unwittingly upset the balance by establishing crown foundations that support certain types of institutions which in past have been primarily funded by government. As agents of government, these foundations can offer significant tax advantages to donors that other non-profit organizations cannot.

There is no question that our governments must cut costs, nor is there a question that government-sponsored services will need to be reduced. We also know that the non-profit sector cannot possibly fill the void that cuts to government grants programs are creating. As a consequence governments must more actively engage the non-profit sector and other funders in the process of minimizing the negative impacts that these funding cuts will have on our communities. Fortunately, while the non-profit sector may not be rich in terms of dollars, it is every bit as rich in leadership capacity and innovation as the corporate and public sectors, if not more so. The development and enhancement of that capacity has become a priority for Vancouver Foundation.

It is increasingly apparent that simply funding charitable agencies to run programs that deal with the needs of our society is not enough. Rather, we must look beyond those immediate concerns, and provide sustenance to the community itself. We must direct support to building leadership, particularly in the non-profit sector, in order to strengthen the financial, organizational and planning capacities within our communities to address present and future social issues.

At Vancouver Foundation, this support takes many forms, perhaps most notably evident in the grants we make. Typically, grantees must demonstrate the financial commitment of the community, not only for the short, but also for the longer term. We also encourage communities to create their own permanent endowments so that they will have the resources to respond to the challenges to come. In addition, the Foundation supports training programs to enhance management and leadership skills in the non-profit sector, and studies

are funded that help charitable organizations provide better information about the issues affecting society, the results of which ultimately facilitate better social policy decisions.

As our communities take on greater responsibility for their own destiny, there is going to be an even greater demand for volunteers in society. It is not the dollars from government or private corporations or Vancouver Foundation that make things happen. It is the individual citizens, the people who embrace and fulfill their social responsibility, by volunteering in their community, serving on the board of a non-profit agency, or simply speaking up. Charities in Canada use an estimated 1.6 million volunteers on a steady basis. They call an additional 2.9 million volunteers to work during peak periods of activity. The quality of life that we enjoy in B.C. today is absolutely dependent on the contribution made by volunteers.

At Vancouver Foundation over the past five years we have made a number of significant changes to preserve and sustain our vitality as a perpetual endowment for the people of British Columbia.

The function of our Advisory Committees, which are made up of volunteers who bring practical experience in a particular field and a base of knowledge we would not otherwise have, has been enhanced through greater involvement in the Foundation's activities.

Our program areas have been more clearly defined and increased collaboration initiated

between each of these areas to both maximize the impact of the grants that are made and eliminate the potential for duplication.

A new process has been put in place to evaluate the effectiveness of the Foundation's grant making and thereby promote more informed grant-making in the future.

We have also modified many of our own internal procedures and systems to allow us to operate with greater effectiveness and efficiency, and to ensure that we remain responsive to both the needs of the community and the interests of our donors.

A central objective is to increase and improve the level of service we provide to donors. Recognizing that planned giving offers tangible benefits to our donors, we are taking a more purposeful approach to providing information and advice that will assist them in planning their gifts, not just to Vancouver Foundation but to other charitable organizations as well.

In closing, I wish to express my personal gratitude to Mr. Thomas Rust, whose steady commitment and wise counsel have carried the Foundation forward during his eight years of exceptional leadership as Chairman of the Board of Directors. I am delighted that Tom will continue his association with Vancouver Foundation as a lifetime honourary Director.

INFORMATION FOR DONORS

Vancouver Foundation's ability over the last fifty years to improve the quality of life across the Province has been made possible by the desire of individuals to give back to the communities which contributed to their success. While wills and bequests continue to be a major source of support, more people are discovering that planned giving techniques make it possible for them to enjoy the satisfaction of giving now, satisfy their practical requirements and meet their charitable objectives and receive immediate tax benefits.

VANCOUVER FOUNDATION In 1943, Vancouver Foundation was established as a public charity with capital of \$100,000. By 1994, as the steward of some 560 permanent endowments, its capital had reached nearly \$400 million.

With the income from its critically important discretionary funds, Vancouver Foundation, despite its name, supports a wide range of charitable activities throughout British Columbia. It provides assistance for program and capital projects that provide effective responses to demonstrated community needs.

A D V A N T A G E S F O R T H E D O N O R For the donor concerned about the community and looking for a meaningful and effective vehicle for giving, Vancouver Foundation offers numerous advantages. > You, as donor, can choose the type of fund to ensure that your charitable wishes are met. > You can simplify your annual charitable giving by writing one cheque to increase the capital of your fund. > You, as donor, have the ongoing satisfaction of giving while Vancouver Foundation takes care of all the paperwork. > For every donation to the Foundation, you receive a donation receipt which can result in a tax credit. > Vancouver Foundation staff and volunteer advisors work closely with nonprofit organizations in British Columbia and understand their roles and needs. This enables the Foundation to target grants where they will do the most good, and meet the charitable goals within your areas of interest. > Professional investment management and a diversified portfolio maximize your Fund's earnings – and the impact of your generosity. > If you wish, your donations and the activities of your Fund can remain completely anonymous or, on the other hand, be recognized in your name or others.

TYPES OF FUNDS There are four types of funds within Vancouver Foundation: unrestricted, field-of-interest, advised, and designated. You may tailor your contribution to your own charitable interests by choosing one (or a combination) of these alternatives.

Through Vancouver Foundation, you can create a fund that will go on giving in your name forever. In a simple agreement ("deed of gift") that accompanies your donation, you can specify how you want your funds to be used.

Donors can name the fund that they endow – for themselves, a family member, a company or a valued friend. Some funds have names that convey a specific goal or purpose, or hold special meaning for the donor.

The fund may be an "open" or "closed" fund. Charitable contributions may be added to an "open" fund, even in modest amounts, by anyone interested in supporting the purposes of the fund. A "closed" fund may only be added to by the donor and family members.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS allow the donor's charitable giving to have the greatest possible impact. The income of this type of fund is applied to the community's most pressing, current needs and has the flexibility to respond to problems as they emerge.

All of the grants awarded to charitable organizations from unrestricted funds are made only after applications for funding have been considered and recommended by an informed Advisory Committee.

FIELD OF INTEREST FUNDS The donor may also establish a fund with the income to be distributed through any one or more of the Foundation's fields of interest. Gifts of this kind give broad discretion to Advisory Committees to select the agencies that can most effectively achieve your charitable intent: > to better understand the scope of each committee, please refer to the committee descriptions, goals and priorities summarized in this Annual Report.

ADVISED FUNDS When you establish an Advised Fund, you are creating a permanent and personal vehicle for charitable giving. During your lifetime, you or your chosen advisor(s) may suggest potential charities to benefit from your fund. When you or other designated advisors no longer wish, or are unable, to make recommendations, your fund can continue its charitable giving as an Unrestricted or Field of Interest Fund.

DESIGNATED FUNDS The income from a Designated Fund is directed to one or more specific charitable organizations. Vancouver Foundation will carry out your wishes so long as the named organizations function as they did when you started the fund. If an organization ceases to exist or substantially changes its purpose, Vancouver Foundation is empowered to redirect the income from your fund for a purpose similar to the one you selected.




FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS > For the 13th year the Foundation provided funds to School Districts so that they could have touring performing arts groups to introduce young people to music, dance and theatre. > Volunteers, students and seasonal workers are ever more critical to the work of cultural organizations. Vancouver Foundation funded the Basic Museum Studies Training Resource in anticipation of the need to provide basic training to more part-time employees and the interested public. > "The Kiss Project", produced by the Judith Marcuse Dance Projects Society, brought to life an exciting collaborative initiative that reached out to new audiences. > Workshops in the Performing Arts in collaboration with Joy Coghill came up with "The Dream Project". Involving professional actors, all over 60 years old, the project helped to broaden their skills in working with and around physical and psychological limitations and challenged our stereotypes about age as portrayed on stage and screen.

EMERGING ISSUES > Government's infrastructure funding, which must be matched from community sources, increases demand for major capital grants. > Government's cutbacks in program grants increases demand for support from Vancouver Foundation for new productions and outreach projects. > Government's reduction in education funding forces curtailment of arts programming for school children – the audiences of the future. > Pressures on arts organizations for audience development increases. > Arts organizations demonstrate a spirit of collective enterprise in the face of difficult circumstances.

CHILD & FAMILY ADVISORY COMMITTEE


GOALS > To support initiatives within communities that promote full access to services for children and their families. > To support initiatives that encourage the healthy development of children and their families. > To support initiatives that develop social and physical environments to foster the optimum development of children. > To advocate as a Foundation for the rights of children as endorsed and guided by the United Nation's Convention on the Rights of the Child. > To support initiatives that advocate for the rights of children.

FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS > The Committee provided funding to Delta Youth Services for the "Girls in the 90's" project, a program intended to help prevent eating disorders in pre-adolescent and adolescent girls. > The Society for Children and Youth of British Columbia received a grant to promote greater understanding of the U.N. Convention on the Rights of the Child, and to create a provincial network to advocate for the inclusion of the needs of children and youth in planning and policy development. > The committee continues to provide small but important capital grants to daycares, transition houses, and other service providers throughout the province. Grants have been made in communities such as Nelson, Port Alberni, Trail, Salmon Arm, Dawson Creek, and Sicamous, to name a few.

EMERGING ISSUES > Recent incidents have clearly illustrated that children are sometimes at risk in our communities. The Foundation is helping to develop initiatives which promote the rights of children and families. > As governments re-assess their capacity to support community initiatives we are actively assisting projects which bring together like-minded organizations to more effectively deliver services to those in need. > The issue of family violence, and violence prevention, remains one of central concern to the Child and Family Committee. > There is a need to more fully recognize the interrelationship between work life and family life, and to create a working culture that is more "family friendly".


1994 PRIORITIES > Educational projects which address the prevention of youth violence. > Educational projects which demonstrate innovation, empowerment, collaboration, cost-effectiveness and/or the ability to promote systemic change. > Demonstration of new enrichment or alternative education programs, particularly those addressing technology in education, and/or innovative approaches to math and science awareness and instruction. > Education research projects. > Projects which encourage parental involvement in schools and/or promote positive attitudes towards learning and the valuing of education in our society.

FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS In an increasingly technical society, the effective development of awareness, knowledge and skills in math and science is imperative. The Education Committee has supported the piloting of new technologies and innovative approaches to instruction, together with role modeling, mentoring and parent involvement initiatives, by providing grants to such projects as: > Parents 4 Science Society – "P4S Pilot Program" > UBC Dept. of Curriculum Studies, Faculty of Education – "Technology-Enhanced Physics Instruction" > Lester B. Pearson College of the Pacific – "Observatory Accessibility" > Foundation for Education and Advancement in Technology – "Project Benchmark"


PRIORITIES > Ecosystems mapping and research to assess biodiversity > Habitat inventorying > Land stewardship > Environmental education

FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS > The south Okanagan is one of the most significant and highly threatened regions for biodiversity in Canada. Funding was provided to the Okanagan Region Wildlife Heritage Fund Society to —assess requirements of rare and threatened fauna and flora —transfer knowledge to land users and managers —help ranchers and landowners to manage livestock and protect the ecosystem from disturbance by humans. > The importance of private land in British Columbia to the integrity of our ecosystems is little understood or appreciated. Vancouver Foundation made grants toward the development of programs to encourage voluntary stewardship of land and the promotion of a sustainable land ethic.

EMERGING ISSUES > The broad range of community and regional land use planning bodies that have sprung up need to coordinate their efforts. > The watershed coalitions and the local stewardship programs they involve represent a growing movement. > There is a great need for habitat and species inventorying and research. The training of grassroots organizations to do the work could accelerate the gathering of such information. > Training programs for First Nations and other communities which are or will become involved in the management of natural resources must be put in place.



FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS > 67% of Committee funding goes outside of Vancouver to support groups in the Lower Mainland and across B.C. > Communities continue to feel the pressure for supporting people's health where they live. 75% of grants enhanced the capacity of organizations to deliver grassroots health programs for British Columbians. > For the sixth year, the Foundation has co-funded the Partners in Organizational Development (POD) program. Through the program, 60 groups from across B.C. will undertake activities to strengthen their planning, financial management & organizational capacities. > 23% of grants supported organizations to deliver a range of programs for seniors.

EMERGING ISSUES > Changes in both the governance of and the delivery system for health care across B.C. has heightened the need for co-funding initiatives that strengthen collaboration and cooperation between agencies. > A burgeoning population and changes in demographics in the Lower Mainland and "small town" B.C. has impacted on the service delivery system and has increased demand for capital grants and greater consideration of diversity and accessibility issues. > The devolution of the government safety net has caused family members and grassroot voluntary organizations to take on an even greater responsibility for the caregiver role and they in turn are requesting more support from funders.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES ADVISORY COMMITTEE


GOALS > To promote health enhancing attitudes and behaviors in young people. > To promote activities which enable young people to be accepted and valued as contributing members at home, in school and in society at large. > To promote crosscultural activities that lead to better understanding among young people. > To promote community initiatives that address basic needs of young people which include adequate food, health care, shelter and social supports. > To promote projects which enhance the self-esteem, leadership skills and competency of young people, and which involve young people in all aspects of the project.

FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS > The Canadian Red Cross Society, through their Child Abuse Prevention Program for Adolescents (CAPPA), received funding to develop an interactive computer program on dating violence. > Young people from a number of Vancouver community centres came together to discuss the role of young people in our city and created a new entity – Youth Voices. Sponsored by the Pacific Legal Education Association, this youth driven group will provide a vehicle for all youth organizations to share, to learn and to build a stronger voice for youth in our community. > Immigrant Services Society received funding to support the New Directions Centre, a life skills and preemployment program for Vietnamese youth who have come in contact with the legal system. > Life Options for Youth Society was given a start-up grant to open the Auto Service Training and Employment Project to provide training and work experience for at risk youth.

EMERGING ISSUES > We still see young people at risk and living on the streets. The Committee continues to give high priority to projects which provide support for these often forgotten youth. > One of the challenges facing young people today is the high level of unemployment and the difficulty of acquiring work experience. The Committee continues to explore ways to assist young people to acquire skills and gain work experiences. > Youth violence, racial tensions and gang activities continue to grab the headlines. The Youth Committee is working with community organizations to promote projects which bring groups of youth from various cultural and ethnic communities together to work for understanding and a more positive image for young people.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1994

1. CONSOLIDATED AND OTHER TRUST FUNDS

The Consolidated Trust Fund comprises those assets over which the Foundation exercises discretionary investment control within guidelines established by the Board of Directors. The Other Trust Funds comprise those assets which the Foundation does not exercise discretionary investment control and which are administered in accordance with specific directions from the donors.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies used by Vancouver Foundation are stated below to assist in understanding the Foundation's financial statements.

BEQUESTS AND GRANTS Bequests are recorded upon receipt of the donated assets. Bequests in a form other than cash or marketable securities are recorded at values assigned by the Board of Directors. Grants are recorded when paid by the Foundation.

INVESTMENTS Investments within the Consolidated Trust Fund are valued at current market prices on the last business day of the fiscal period. Unrealized gains or losses arising as a result of the revaluation of investments to current market prices as well as any realized gains or losses arising from investment transactions are reflected as capital surplus. Investments within the Other Trust Funds are stated at cost and any realized gains or losses arising from investment transactions are included as part of contributed principal.

OFFICE EQUIPMENT AND LEASEHOLD IMPROVEMENTS The cost of office equipment and leasehold improvements are recorded and expensed when incurred.

INVESTMENT INCOME Interest income on bonds, mortgages and short-term notes is accrued as earned. Dividends which have been declared are recorded as income on the date of record set for the dividend.

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES Administrative expenses and trust company fees are recorded on an accrual basis.

3. RESTRICTIONS ON PRINCIPAL AND INCOME

Substantially all of the contributed principal and capital surplus of the Vancouver Foundation and the income from contributed principal is restricted as to payment.

4. TRANSFER FROM W.J. VANDUSEN FOUNDATION

During 1994, the W.J. VanDusen Foundation transferred all of its capital assets to the Vancouver Foundation. This transaction was effective February 28, 1994, with a total market value of \$48 million (cost \$38.1 million) being transferred. The W.J. VanDusen Foundation has been maintained as a non-operating entity incorporated under the Society Act of Alberta. Two of its Directors are officers of the

Vancouver Foundation and the third Director is a Director of the Vancouver Foundation.

5. TRUST COMPANY AND INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT FEES

In June 1993, the Foundation transferred the management of its Consolidated Trust Fund investments to three investment managers in anticipation of generating a higher return. Fees charged to the Foundation are based on a percent of the market value of investments.

6. ARTWORK

The Foundation owns a number of paintings with an appraised value of \$658,300 (1993 - \$795,300). This artwork was bequested to the Foundation in 1990 and 1992. No amount has been recorded in the financial statements for this artwork. The Foundation's intention is to sell these paintings once market conditions are strong enough to maximize proceeds on disposition. Once disposed of, the amount received will be recorded as an investment in the Consolidated Trust Fund.

7. COMMITMENTS

Vancouver Foundation has firm grant commitments totalling \$6,004,908 (1993 - \$5,561,017) which will be paid out of distributable income as follows:
