





Investment Committee Report – 1973

The policy of the Investment Committee continued as in previous years to deal with donations and bequests to the Foundation through the Consolidated Trust Fund for investment and income purposes unless directed by the donors to the contrary. This means that each fund, no matter its size, is fully invested in a portfolio which at the year end comprised 66% in fixed income securities and 34% in equities.

Of the 112 funds under administration, units of the Consolidated Trust Fund comprise all the assets of 100 funds, and some of the assets of another 7 funds. The Contributed Principal of The Consolidated Trust Fund increased in 1973 from \$23,423,612 to \$29,036,794; of this increase \$3,499,666 came from new donations and bequests and \$2,113,518 by transfers from other trust funds.

In our Statement of Assets at December 31st, 1973, the Consolidated Trust investments are reported at market value. New funds or additions to existing funds are credited with units in the Consolidated Trust Fund on the basis of the market valuation at the end of each quarterly period. The assets of the other funds are carried at cost.

The past year was one of high interest rates on fixed income securities and short term funds. In the equity market there were wide fluctations due to economic and political uncertainties. Income for the year from the Consolidated Trust Fund was \$1,879,166. After deducting administration expense and trust companies' fees this represented an 11% increase from 57¢ per unit in 1972 to 63¢ per unit in 1973. The value per unit decreased by 3% from the previous year end.

Report of the Distribution Committee-1973

In 1973 Vancouver Foundation distributed a total of \$2,685,294 from 112 funds now under our administration. Of this sum \$1,167,955 or 43% was from Endowment Income and Capital which has been designated for specific charitable purposes by the donors. The balance of \$1,517,339 was distributed by the Foundation under recommendations from six committees which have each given careful consideration to over 250 applications received from organizations and individuals seeking support. Committee Chairmen dealing with Cultural Activities, Education, Child Welfare, Youth Activities and Medical Services and Research have reported separately. The largest other category is Religion under which heading \$532,507 has been distributed largely by designation to United and Anglican Church organizations. Under this heading as well as under the general heading of Health and Welfare, The Salvation Army has received over \$100,000, a substantial portion of which went toward their New Center in South Vancouver now under construction. A further sizeable commitment has been made to the Opportunity Rehabilitation Workshop on Victoria Drive, Vancouver for the extension of their premises.

From the B.C. Diasaster Relief Fund we were pleased to provide a grant of \$20,000 to the B.C. & Yukon Division of The Canadian Red Cross. This enabled them to acquire a modern fully equipped vehicle to be used for training volunteers and be available to provide emergency relief in any disaster area on the mainland of British Columbia.

Vancouver Foundation has long been a supporter of the Victorian Order of Nurses and has again assisted in its Meals on Wheels, Housekeeping, and Home Nursing Services.

Endowment Income set aside for The United Way (United Community Services) increases year by year and the amount of \$131,817 in 1973 went a long way toward meeting their operating costs. In this way all the agencies that share in the Annual United Way Appeal Drive benefit from the General Fund of Vancouver Foundation.

The distribution from Vancouver Foundation in 1973 reached a record figure, and the members of the several committees who have reviewed the numerous submissions to the Vancouver Foundation are thanked for the time and careful attention they have given to their duties.



Child Welfare

Out of a total of \$466,620 distributed in 1973 for Child Welfare purposes, a large portion, \$232,853 — was endowment income specifically directed to The Children's Hospital, Vancouver, for equipment and research purposes authorized by the Directors of The Children's Hospital Foundation.

Distribution of the remaining available funds has followed a similar pattern to that of the previous year: \$89,760 in grants to various Departments of the University of British Columbia for research studies and services in pre-natal and post-natal diseases of children; \$20,538 for similar purposes at The Health Centre for Children. Day Care and Pre-school Centres including facilities for teaching deaf children received a total of \$59,625. Grants totalling approximately \$63,000 were made to various voluntary agencies and public organizations providing services and facilities for the care and recreation of children who are constantly the concern of the community.

Community concern for child welfare is evidenced by the increasing amount of support received by Vancouver Foundation from donors who wish to contribute to this cause.

A total of \$269,906 has been disbursed for Educational purposes in 1973 which compares with \$199,365 in 1972. Of this total \$62,856 was endowment income from funds which have been designated by the donors for specific educational organizations. The Committee of The H. R. MacMillan Family Funds has authorized substantial sums for the Faculty of Forestry at the University of British Columbia, for student aid in certain School Districts, and for building programs at two Independent Schools. Additionally, the Educational Advisory Committee has recommended a grant for building purposes at The Lester Pearson College of the Pacific which is in course of construction near Victoria. It has also continued support of the Canada Studies Foundation in respect of its Canada West Projects. This long range study is to be completed in 1975.


Our support of students at various universities, colleges and schools in British Columbia has continued. 120 students have been assisted to a total amount of \$39,850. Research studies are also being continued in the Civil Engineering Department at the University of British Columbia into the flood conditions on several river basins in British Columbia with support from The B.C. Disaster Relief Fund.


The Cultural Activities Advisory Committee has met at regular intervals throughout 1973 and has considered applications for support of over 50 organizations sponsoring cultural activities and interest in Greater Vancouver and in other parts of British Columbia. A total of \$357,687 has been distributed for what we have classified as cultural activities in 1973 which is an increase from a figure of \$276,055 in 1972.

Once again the Committee has placed emphasis on community organizations catering to wide cultural interests. At the same time we have also attempted to encourage youth in cultural pursuits and have been able to provide aid through The Helen Pitt and other funds for talented students recommended to us in fine arts, music and opera.

Development of the VanDusen Botanical Gardens is proceeding under the direction of The Vancouver Parks Board. We are encouraged to anticipate the completion of this outstanding civic project in 1975.


The total amount disbursed including designated endowment income was \$220,142 as compared with \$228,364 in 1972.

The Directors of The B.C. Medical Services Foundation continue to administer the substantial portion of funds disbursed by Vancouver Foundation for medical research and services in British Columbia.

During 1973 Mr. W. J. Robinson, a long time supporter of Medical Services Association, died and was replaced on the Board by Mr. Ray Mercer. Mr. D. H. Bell-Irving has replaced Mr. Justice A. B. B. Carrothers on the latter's appointment as a Judge of the B.C. Court of Appeal. Dr. T. McCusker has also been appointed to succeed Mr. I. W. McDonald as a representative of Medical Services Association on the Board and Mrs. Beverley Field succeeds Mr. P. S. Plant as the University representative.

A total of \$346,110 has been disbursed by Vancouver Foundation in 1973 for medical research and paramedical services. Of this sum \$280,533 has come from The B.C. Medical Services Foundation and \$65,577 from other funds of Vancouver Foundation to The G. F. Strong Rehabilitation Centre for its Capital Building Program and elsewhere for cancer research, medical scholarships and lectureships.

In addition to providing for medical research through the universities and hospitals as itemized in this report, the B.C. Medical Services Foundation endeavours to provide funds for health care and services throughout British Columbia when these expenditures are not covered by Government and other funding agencies.

The other trust funds comprise those assets which are administered in accordance with specific directions from the donors or which do not qualify under the British and Canadian Insurance Companies' Act as consolidated trust fund investments.
- Vancouver Foundation has commitments for grants totalling \$507,859 payable in 1974 out of distributable income at end of year amounting to \$952,723. (Commitments in 1972—\$384,984).

How to Make Use of Vancouver Foundation 1. By Lifetime Gifts which will declare

These can be made to the GENERAL FUND for distribution as directed in Vancouver Foundation Act, or to any of the SPECIAL FUNDS already established to assist various charitable and educational purposes, or to the establishment of another SPECIAL FUND or FOUNDA-TION for any of the objects of Vancouver Foundation.

When a gift is made to the General Fund, or to an already established Special Fund, a letter addressed to Vancouver Foundation should accompany the gift, specifying the Fund to which the gift is to be applied and the acknowledgement of Vancouver Foundation (which is a non-profit organization for charitable purposes within the meaning of the Income Tax Act) will complete the transaction. Any gift may be made anonymously.

If the donor wishes to establish a Special Fund or Foundation, either under his or her own name, or in any name to be associated perpetually with such Special Fund or Foundation, a Deed of Gift will be prepared
