Chairman's Report - 1974

This is the 31st Annual Report of Vancouver Foundation. In its earlier days questions were often times asked: "What is Vancouver Foundation?", "What does it do?". Today the term "Foundation" is better known; we are told there are 1400 Foundations in Canada and 26,000 in the United States. However not all these Foundations have the same functions or purposes, and the term has been used with different meanings in a variety of ways.

In the case of Vancouver Foundation the salient features as defined in the Provincial Charter of its Incorporation are:

- 1. Its Endowments.
- 2. Its Permanence.
- 3. Its dedication to charitable objects in the Community.

Its Endowments are gifts, whether of a lifetime or testamentary nature, which are received in any form, converted into money and invested to produce income. The Foundation started with nothing save a charter, but throughout the 31 years of its existence, gifts or endowments have been received in varying amounts from year to year. There can be no regularity, or predetermined schedule for these gifts because they are always voluntary and dependent on the wishes and circumstances of the donor. They can come from any source large or small that may avail itself of the provisions of the initial charter of the Foundation.

The permanence of the Vancouver Foundation is demonstrated by the fact that in each of the years of its existence gifts have been made, funds have been added to, and new funds formed which today total 116 in number representing the accummulated gifts of many thousands of individuals and organizations. The flow continues and in the year 1974 there were 200 such gifts having a value of \$2,300,000, bringing the aggregate to \$43,000,000.

At each year end this aggregate amount is valued according to market circumstances, but the resultant figure represents only the value at a given date. This, in view of our Directors, is necessary and proper in terms of responsible accountability. However, in the terms of the old adage "the proof of the pudding is in the eating", the kernel is what have these aggregate gifts produced?

The answer to this question in 1974 is \$3,625,000 — a larger sum than in any previous year, and \$600,000 (or 20%) more than in 1973. With prudent and responsible administration it is hoped at least to maintain this level of "income" in dollars. Whether it can be improved upon and what those dollars will provide in terms of goods and services in future depends upon those much debated factors, "inflation" and the "cost of living".

Vancouver Foundation in 1974 distributed \$3,305,000 or 90% of the income it received for charitable objects in the community (compared with \$2,685,000 in 1973). This distribution conformed with the wishes of those who provided the initial endowments, or where directed by those donors the distribution was carried out under the authority of our Directors and their advisors.

The report which follows tells the story of these functions in detail for 1974, and my concluding comment is an expression of thanks to our Donors, Directors, Advisors and Administrators who have made these results possible in the year just past.





Investment Committee Report – 1974

Donations to the Foundation are invested in units of the Consolidated Trust Fund unless directed by the donor to the contrary. This means that each fund, no matter its size, is fully invested. At the year end there were 116 funds under administration and the Consolidated Trust Fund comprised all the assets of 100 of these and part of the assets of another 9 funds. Investments were 64% in fixed income securities and 36% in equities at the year end.

New funds or additions to existing funds are credited with units on the basis of the market valuation at the end of each quarterly period. Contributed principal of the Consolidated Trust Fund increased in 1974 from \$29,036,794 to \$31,898,894

The assets of the other funds are carried at cost or at valuation at date of acquisition.

1974 was a year of high interest rates which while of benefit on new purchases and the short term investment of temporary funds, had a depressing effect on the prices of bonds already in the portfolio. The equity markets similarly suffered.


This decline in markets was reflected in the unit value of the Consolidated Trust Fund units which at the year end was 14% lower than at December 1973. There has been a considerable recovery in both bond and equity markets since the year end.

With few exceptions the funds within the Vancouver Foundation distribute income only. Thus the lower value per unit did not affect the income available for distribution which was up both overall and on a per unit basis.

Fifty-eight adults over 19 years of age registered between 1960-1973 at the B.C. Division, Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society have been participating in a Vancouver Foundation funded juvenile rheumatoid arthritis research project, conducted by three principle researchers. Findings are now being collated and will provide guidelines to physicians and other counsellors of other juvenile rheumatoid arthritis patients and their parents as to future lifestyles.



Report of the Distribution Committee-1974

Vancouver Foundation has distributed in 1974 a total of \$3,305,000 from 116 funds under our administration. This compares with \$2,685,000 distributed in 1973 and represents distribution of over 90% of the income derived from those funds in the year.

The wide range of charitable organizations in the community who turn to us for support has necessitated in recent years the establishment of advisory committees who make recommendations to the Distribution Committee of the Foundation's Board of Directors in their respective spheres of interest and concern. These Committees meet quarterly and have reviewed over 250 applications submitted to us during the course of the year.

Of the \$3,305,000 distributed during the year \$1,398,000 went by designation. The Children's Hospital, Vancouver, received \$247,645 followed by The United Way of Greater Vancouver - \$177,396 and The Vancouver School of Theology - \$177,715. Further amounts aggregating \$223,536 were paid for various activities in The United Church of Canada serving British Columbia.

There has been a significant increase in the amount of discretionary money distributed for Cultural Activities in the community. This amount rose from \$246,576 in 1973 to \$462,709 in 1974. This is indicative of the increasing activity of the community in cultural pursuits both in the established organizations and also in new groups, amateur and professional, that have been formed to serve not only the Greater Vancouver Area but the Province as a whole. A number of these organizations have received national recognition for the excellence of their performance.

As our discretionary funds continue to grow our several committees are concerned to use the resources given to us in areas of greatest need. As examples our Board has committed itself, or has already paid increased amounts to the Boy's & Girl's Clubs, to the Community Music School and to Independent Education so that organizations in these areas may serve a growing segment of our youth population who can benefit from these facilities. We intend in the current year to provide support for comprehensive care facilities for senior citizen though the need in this area seems far beyond the capacity of one Foundation. Concern for the "battered child" is another problem in our society to which our attention has been called.

Rising costs for services and materials are reflected in the budgets of voluntary organizations as well as in Government and industry. It may be that Vancouver Foundation will find it necessary to make fewer grants of larger amounts in future in order that worthwhile organizations of proven competence may be enabled to continue efficient and effective service.



A total of \$453,740 was distributed in support of Child Welfare in 1974. Of this amount \$347,422 went to The Children's Hospital, Vancouver, and to The University of British Columbia for research equipment and services related to physically and mentally handicapped children and related children's diseases. The Committee has continued to support Day Care and Pre-School Centres in the acquisition of equipment for their facilities. It also assisted Central City Mission in the furnishings and equipment for their new Group Homes for Children located in Richmond, Delta and Haney, British Columbia. Support of a Bicycle Safety Program in the Schools was again provided, and several Children's Camps received assistance.

The support and advice of Committee members and of the Medical Profession is appreciated by our Board of Directors.

Student aid in the form of scholarships and bursaries continues to claim a sizeable portion of the funds distributed by the Educational Advisory Committee. While the number of students assisted was down slightly from the previous year, the amount per student showed an average increase in view of rising educational costs. Further support was extended to The Lester Pearson College of The Pacific toward its Capital Building Campaign and our Committee has provided increased support for scholarship and building purposes at Independent Seconday Schools in British Columbia in order to make these educational facilities more readily available for increased enrolment of British Columbia students. An interesting Series of Lectures on Community Growth was sponsored through the Westwater Research Centre.

There has been a marked increase in the number of applications received during 1974 from a variety of organizations engaged in Cultural Activities in the community and the total amount of our support has been enlarged from \$357,687 in 1973 to \$631,975 in 1974. The figures include the amounts we have committed to toward completion of the VanDusen Botanical Gardens and Floral Hall which should be open to the public in 1975. We have continued our sponsorship of the Musical Director and Conductor of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and have also encouraged the Community Music School of Greater Vancouver with a sizeable grant toward the completion of new facilities for young musicians at Vanier Park. The Bill Reid Exhibition of Indian Art at The Vancouver Art Gallery which was sponsored by Vancouver Foundation attracted significant public appreciation. The new facilities for cultural activities in North Vancouver undertaken by The Community Arts Centre is also another community project deserving of mention.

With growing interest in cultural activities throughout the Province it is increasingly difficult for our Committee to meet all the claims that are made on our available resources.



How to Make Use of Vancouver Foundation

1. By Lifetime Gifts

Under the Vancouver Foundation Act any lifetime gift may be made to Vancouver Foundation for charitable purposes. If no direction is given the gift will be applied to the GENERAL FUND for United Way of the Greater Vancouver Area.

Directions may be given to establish a SPECIAL FUND bearing the name of the donor or any other name to be associated perpetually with the gift and any subsequent additions thereto. Gifts may also be made for addition to any of the open funds already established by Vancouver Foundation for a variety of charitable objects or organizations. Discretion may be given to the Directors of Vancouver Foundation to apply the gift and the income to be derived therefrom to any charitable object, or the donor may state the persons, if any, upon whose discretion the Directors are to rely in distributing monies from the Fund so established.

Under its simple rules of administration Vancouver Foundation will carry out the wishes of the donor provided these are charitable in nature and do not conflict with the provisions of the Vancouver Foundation Act which is a Statute of the Province of British Columbia. A letter, or Deed of Gift will declare the purposes of the gift and the income to arise therefrom and this will be officially acknowledged by the Foundation. Any gift may be made anonymously.

2. By Will

The Testator who wishes to make a testamentary gift to Vancouver Foundation will be advised by his or her solicitor that by Will the same choice of a gift to Vancouver Foundation may be made as might be done by lifetime gift. A testamentary gift may be for a specific amount or for the residue of an estate or any portion thereof.

Testamentary gifts for charitable purposes may be subject to certain exemptions under the Succession Duty Act of British Columbia and testators are encouraged to seek advice on existing legislation.

Vancouver Foundation is a registered non-profit organization for charitable purposes within the provisions of the Income Tax Act of Canada and is authorized to issue receipts for taxation purposes under that Act.

3. Endowment Funds

Voluntary charitable organizations may when desired establish Memorial or Endowment Funds in Vancouver Foundation for administration under terms which conform with their charitable objects. In these circumstances the annual income will be applied by Vancouver Foundation in accordance with those objects as may be directed.

4. Other Relevant Statutes

Because there are other public statutes which relate to charitable gifts whether made during a donor's life or by his or her will, professional advice should be taken before a gift is made or the will prepared containing such a gift. Vancouver Foundation welcomes inquiries and preliminary discussions of the factors involved, some of which may have favourable tax consequences.



Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1974

- 1. The consolidated trust fund comprises those assets over which the Foundation exercises discretionary investment control within guidelines established by the Board of Directors. The other trust funds comprise those assets which are administered in accordance with specific directions from the donors or which do not qualify under the British and Canadian Insurance Companies' Act as consolidated trust fund investments.
- Vancouver Foundation has commitments for grants totalling \$465,691 payable in 1975 out of distributable income at end of year amounting to \$1,227,454. (Commitments in 1973 — \$507,859.)
- 3. Distributable income includes a reserve for administration expenses of \$84,098 at December 31, 1974.
